#### I. Welcome & Introductions

**Jim King** called the meeting to order at about 6:35 PM. The attendees introduced themselves. A quorum was present.

#### II. Approval of August Minutes

Minutes for the August meeting were approved.

## III. Admit New Member Neighborhoods

As of this September meeting, 31 neighborhoods had paid 2012 dues. No new neighborhoods requested membership.

## V. Guest Speaker - Honorable Sam Massell, President of the Buckhead Coalition

Sam Massell, former Mayor of Atlanta and President of the Buckhead Coalition, started by commending BCN for what it is doing, speaking for the 78,000 residents of Buckhead. The Coalition was formed 25 years ago as a supplement for government, waiting in the shadows until needed. Charlie Loudermilk was the person behind the Coalition concept. He said their mission is to nurture the quality of life for those who work, visit, live and play here in Buckhead. He said there were two things they don't do: they don't get involved in any zoning issues and they don't get involved in any partisan politics. They do have a political action committee that addresses city elections: the mayor, city council and board of education. He said they created a community improvement district which now raises over \$5 million a year, money that goes to mobility, mainly the Peachtree Boulevard project. He said to "keep your eyes open—in a few years they are going to have lots of money and no project."

He said that there have been two issues in which the Coalition and neighborhoods were at odds. They lobbied for the extension of GA 400. He said in hindsight he thought they did the right thing. He said it was a bitter fight that has taken years to try to heal. The other issue involved traffic and the Peachtree Park neighborhood. He said it made a lot of sense (to them) to connect Pharr Road to Lenox Road. The connection was to "be airborne so it wouldn't go into the neighborhood." The neighborhood and Mayor Jackson was against it. He said those were the two big differences over 24 years.

Sam said that other than traffic and crime, the major issue we are all concerned about is the economy. He said their thinking had been "that a luxury market like Buckhead would be the last to feel it and the first to come out of it." He said that we are definitely coming out of it. Enumerating the projects, he said Buckhead had 2,683 apartment units either currently under construction or planned by reputable developers. He said then the recession started  $3\frac{1}{2}$  years ago, there was not a single unit planned. None the next year, or the one after that. Now, we are looking at a 21% increase in Buckhead's apartments!

People are moving into Buckhead. He said four years ago the country was laughing at us because we had four new office buildings, totaling two million square feet, empty. He said the Coalition ran two full page ads in the <u>Wall Street Journal</u> saying to the world that those who had wanted to move to Buckhead could now afford to. It was an issue of supply and demand. Now the demand is coming back. He said two of those buildings are 90% occupied. Eight hundred thousand square feet of additional office space is planned or underway. A \$100 million North Atlanta high school is under way. A missing ramp connecting GA 400 and I-85 is under construction which will greatly reduce surface street traffic. \$30 million is being spent to complete the second phase of the Peachtree Boulevard project. And the 2010 Census showed that while the City of Atlanta grew by 0.8%, Buckhead grew by 17.8% -- all of Atlanta's growth took place in Buckhead.

Massell said the growth occurred because of leadership. Forty neighborhood associations with leaders, 34 church congregations with leaders, seven school PTAs with leaders, five service clubs, etc. Buckhead's success is not luck, it's leadership. And the Buckhead Coalition is part of it. Massell went on to say, "If I weren't the president of the Buckhead Coalition, I would say that your organization was the most important organization in Buckhead. You are really a fine, important group and I can't brag enough about you".

Massell announced a new program, the "Buckhead Ambassador" program. The goal is to create some new young leadership. It will involve about two dozen Buckhead men and women age 20 to 30. He wants nominations. They will receive a booklet on places they could serve as volunteers and a list of elective offices they might be qualified to run for. Business training seminars would also be provided.

Jane Rawlings asked, given the failure of the TSPLOST, what can be done to improve transportation? He said that businesses supported the TSPLOST vote but not enough emphasis was paid to the neighborhoods and residents. He spoke of the success of the MARTA vote he championed years before as a potential mode. He said a different plan involving the grass roots was needed.

In conclusion, Massell said he would like the neighborhoods and the Coalition to each consider the other as partners.

- **Education** There were comments about a Nancy Meister meeting. Mark MyGrant has been brought back to be temporary principal of North Atlanta.

- Parks Gordon Certain said that a briefing was made to the Parks Department about the "Mountain Way Common" park. Also, a fund raiser, a wine tasting event, was planned for the park on October 6.

**Barbara Kennedy** encouraged neighborhoods to stay involved in Park Pride meetings and the quarterly Parks Commissioner meetings because there is grant money available if you are involved enough to learn about it. She said that Collier Hills had received grant money for a mural for a bridge that has been covered with graffiti. [The next quarterly Parks Commissioner's Greenspace meeting is on Wednesday, November 14 from 5:30-7:00 pm at the Civic Center.]

**Ron Grunwald** said that Loring Heights had received a \$50,000 matching grant from Park Pride. He said neighborhoods should visit the Park Pride web site – they have \$400 thousand in grant money available for improvements to city parks. Ron also said that Trees Atlanta had a program to plant 10,000 trees in the right-of-way and in parks.

- Property Taxes No Report.
- Public Safety Tiffany Harlow, Zone 2 Community Prosecutor, said that she was creating a separate group to discuss cases the Fulton County DA is pursuing in Zone 2. She will contact BCN neighborhoods.

Tiffany said they are setting up "Neighborhood Take Backs" in reaction to gang activity. She said they are seeing a big increase in gangs, mostly juvenile gangs. She said that Major Hobbs had identified certain areas around the Lindbergh corridor where gangs are entering automobiles and doing residential and commercial burglaries.

#### Transportation, Development and Infrastructure

#### Lindbergh SPI-15

**Yolanda Adrean** said that the two committees addressing the Lindbergh SPI-15 rezoning had both forwarded their respective ordinances to the full City Council "without recommendation". The Council will consider them on Monday. She saw revised renderings presented by the developer today. A lot of work has been done to comply with the SPI, but Yolanda said the result "leaves a lot to be desired". Yolanda wasn't sure about the Council vote. She said emails are starting to be sent to all of the councilmembers, which she said is important. She said try to be specific in the emails.

In response to **Jane Rawling**'s question, Yolanda said the proposed seven-acre surface parking lot had been reconfigured to a roughly three-acre, two-level parking deck. Yolanda was concerned that there was not enough parking for Walmart workers. She was also concerned about the impact on already struggling nearby retail. Jane asked many other questions about the revised site plan, which Yolanda answered. Many of the proposed small retail stores have no tenants yet.

Jane read provisions of the Comprehensive Development Plan (CDP) which defines "Mixed Use" as buildings which have two or more uses – she said that none of the proposed buildings fit that definition and thus aren't "mixed use". She thus argued the proposed development wasn't a "mixed use development".

Yolanda encouraged neighborhoods to come to the City Council and speak. [Subsequently, the City Law Department ruled that no such comments would be allowed.]

This discussion went on and on.

#### Sandy Springs Gateway Project

Jim King described the 21-acre proposal on Roswell Road in Sandy Springs with a driveway connecting to West Wieuca Road in Atlanta. The site plan includes a grocery store and miscellaneous retail out parcels as well as 700 apartments. The plan triggers the ARC's DRI (development of regional importance) threshold. The development is similar to the Lindbergh proposal, though the retail component isn't as large and no parks are proposed. Like Lindbergh, the project is called "mixed use", though all uses are separate. The location on Roswell is problematic since Roswell is already very crowded and experiences congestion due to lack of traffic signal coordination and the lack of a street grid in the area. Traffic is likely to backup into Buckhead worse than today. The High Point and Cherokee Park neighborhoods are working with North Buckhead and Chastain Park. #### Deering Road/AMTRAK/Northside

Ron Grunwald said the City and GOT had maintained in an earlier BCN meeting that it was not possible to sequence their projects one after the other to minimize impact on the neighborhoods. Inexplicably, now everything has changed. He said they were notified today by GDOT that the AMTRAK project was being delayed to avoid impacting Deering before the holidays. Instead, they will start in January with a target completion in June. The Northside Drive/Collier project bidding documents now stipulate that the closing of Northside be delayed until Deering Road opens again. These changes were badly needed and will be appreciated. We were heard.

#### **Bishop Street in Loring Heights**

**Ron Grunwald** said Bishop Street runs along the southeast edge of Loring Heights next to the Norfolk Southern Railroad tracks. Ron received a variance application from Odyssey Sports to decrease required parking from 2,500 spaces to 1,000. Odyssey is proposing a 550,000 square foot campus for training in team sports: a full-size Olympic pool, full-size soccer field, full-size Lacrosse field, 16 tennis courts, a hockey rink, all on about six acres. He said the existing zoning

is industrial, so there may not be much the neighborhoods can do about it. Traffic will be an issue. He said the project would be designated a DRI. Everything right now is preliminary.

## **Mountain Way Court Case**

Gordon Certain reported on a case in North Buckhead involving a case of violations of building permit and watershed permit requirements and stop work orders. After a number of court appearances, the defendant finally signed a plea deal and agreed to fines and other conditions. Among the conditions were that unless all improvements that have been made in the past two years are removed within 60 days, the defendant will have to serve 360 days in jail. The City did a great job supporting the neighbors, and the neighbors did a great service to the city in being willing to testify. [As of this writing on the 64<sup>th</sup> day, no demolition has happened.]


